Queenie Mills Memorial Wall



In 1998, with a lead gift of \$40,000, Queenie Mills, PhD, established the Queenie Mills Endowment Fund with a dual purpose: to provide for the creation of a memorial garden, where people could honor the memory of their beloved pets, and to fund future operations and capital improvements at CCHS. The recent landscape makeover of the humane society's grounds and the installation of the Queenie Mills Memorial Wall bring Queenie Mills' vision to life.

Queenie's ideals inspired the landscape design and development of the memorial wall. The paths, trees, and benches around the shelter offer a pleasant environment for people and dogs to spend time together. The Memorial Wall provides what Queenie wanted for every pet owner who grieves the loss of an animal friend - a way to honor that memory with a permanent marker and to be surrounded by people who understand the depth of that loss.

Custom-engraved granite plaques to memorialize beloved pets are available for a donation of \$500 or \$750 (depending on plaque size). Plaques are permanently installed on the stone wall leading to the humane society entrance. Funds raised through the purchase of memorial plaques will support the Society's programs and services.

On the day they arrive, behind their eyes lie only mysteries. On the day they go home, the mystery is gone...replaced by sheer joy.

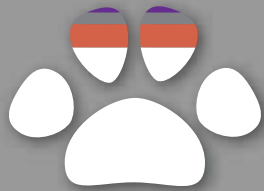

Veterinary Care

The CCHS Medical Department includes a veterinarian, five staff members, 4-6 interns, and several volunteers. From the moment they arrive at the shelter and throughout their stay, animals are vaccinated and closely monitored to minimize stress and discomfort, and prevent the spread of infectious disease.

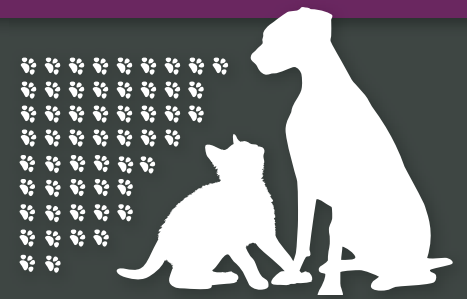
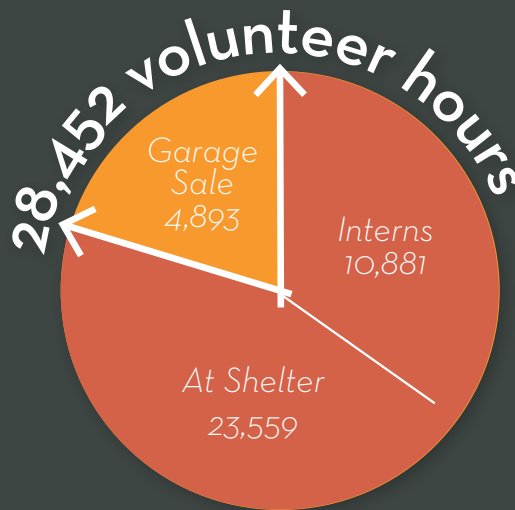

LOW COST VETERINARY CARE

One of the biggest challenges faced by animal shelters nationwide is cat overpopulation. Thanks to a grant from the Edith Goode Trust, we are able to sterilize free-roaming cats at no cost.

We also assist low-income pet owners by offering affordable spay/neuter surgery for cats and dogs on an ongoing basis.

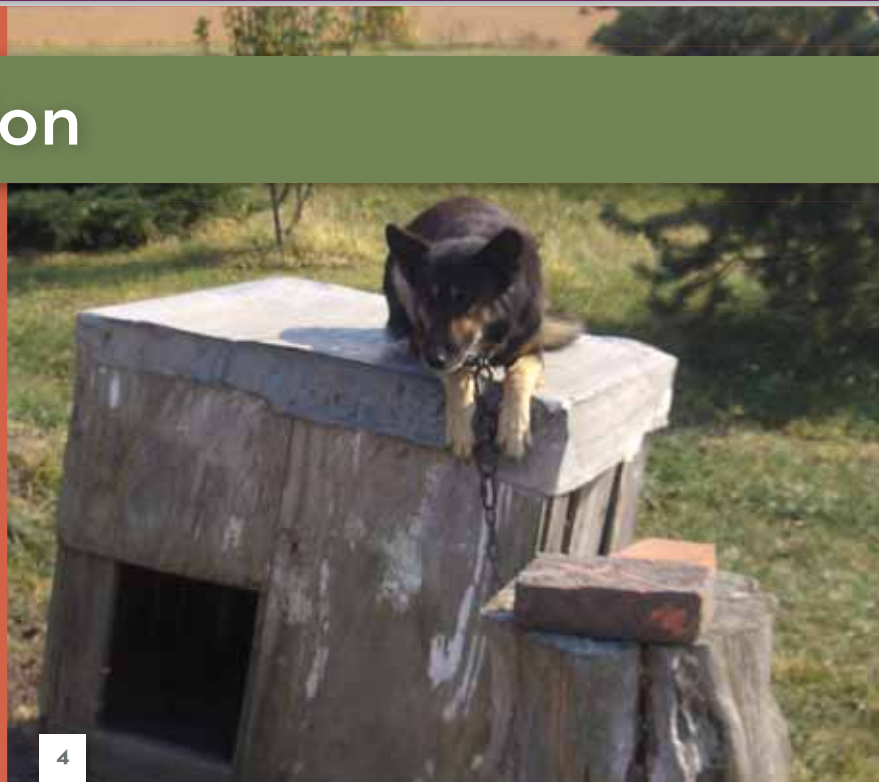
